**Advising Notes**

Students can take a maximum of 15 credit hours per semester unless approved by the MSSW Program Director and the Graduate School.

Students must take 6 hours of electives for the MSSW degree. They can be taken in the summer or spring. In addition to the MSSW electives, students may take a required course from the other concentration or another graduate level course (with approval).

Students enrolled in a graduate certificate program are required to take three electives (9 hours).

Dropped classes will likely impact time to graduation and financial aid eligibility. Transfer and proficiency credits will most likely result in fewer credit hours in a semester, and this may impact financial aid eligibility.
